

ANTONIO PIZZARELLA

Clinical report relating to Mr Pizzarella Antomo, resident in Padua

I am meeting with Mr Pizzarella Antonio today, who has been referred to me by his therapist Dr Elena Varoli.

The patient tells his story of illness, which began in 2014 following the onset of algic symptoms that many years later were attributed to pudendal nerve pain.

Over the years, however, the patient has suffered many disabling conditions disabling situations, as well as having to deal with pain that interfered with his quality of life, leading to immobility, isolation and withdrawal from everyday activities, with consequent feelings of injustice and anger, which were however well managed and rationalised.

Over time, the depressive state, reactive to health issues, was treated health, has been treated with duloxetine, pregabalin, carbamazepine, olanzapine and BDZ, while today the treatment consists of DULOXETINE 90 MG PER DAY, CLONAZEPAM 15 mg TID EVENING, AMITRIPTILINE 8 mg TID 3 TIMES A DAY, OLANZAPINE 2.5 MG IN THE EVENING AND DIAZEPAM 10"-GTT 2 TIMES A DAY.

On physical examination, the patient appears alert, lucid, oriented t/p/o; his appearance is slightly subdued, his facial expressions tense but expressive, psychomotor skills appear normal, speech is fluent and spontaneous, appropriate to the school level. S1 observes a stable mood but settled on the low tones, reactively to the profound restrictions of life secondary to the state of illness,

the anxious quotas at the time of the interview appear contained. No alterations in the ideational or perceptive sphere are observed. The sleep/wake rhythm is drug-regulated. Absence of ideation or self-injurious intentionality, no auto- or hetero-directed aggressiveness. The patient does not bring any clinical documentation, but reports that he has recent blood chemistry and ECG tests were normal, but he appears very aware and able to provide all the necessary details.

I hypothesise a diagnosis of CHRONIC ADAPTATION DISORDER WITH DEFLECTED MOOD, at the time of the visit in a state of good clinical compensation.

You will see the patient again in a couple of months to assess the case.
